## PT:

I've been a Lib Dem since 2015 and therefore am basically ancient in YL. However, I only really got involved with Young Liberals in 2021. I'm a Carer, and a first generation student (now graduate!) from a working class family. I've had to juggle many things from a young age but it's this very adversity that's played such a huge role in me becoming involved in politics. I don't want to be on the outside complaining, if I can, I want to try and change things for the better. Yet simultaneously, I'm very aware of the institutional issues we have in Britain having come up against them myself. Therefore, these experiences underpin my approach to politics as a whole. It's why I'm a Liberal Democrat.

## Member Recruitment:

As chair, I want to use our national success to generate more members within local constituencies who are able to mobilise when needed! Young Liberals have been integral in many campaigns and are a resource we should be nurturing and growing in order to win seats, both local and parliamentary. We need to encourage more participation and then be able to retain that participation for prolonged success. I do not want you to vote for me purely because I am a woman or because I am a brown Sikh candidate. Yes, Young Liberals desperately need ethnic diversity, but your vote should be on the basis of merit, which I do believe I have. I hope that you consider me as the woman for the job and if elected, I would be honoured to represent and work for the Young Liberals in the South East and oversee what will hopefully be, our continued success.
